Greetings Comrades,



The DPA 2023-2024 ALL STATE Membership Program is in the air and if you have not yet seen it, contact your Post Adjutant or Post Commander to get a copy. The DPA AS Membership Program mirrors the VFW AA Membership Program in many respects. I know this isn't your first rodeo, so I'll not belabor the requirements other than to say NOW is the time to ATTACK our membership goals of 100% for All State and 102% for All American. If the early bird does indeed get the worm, then flocking together early and often should yield the results we are looking for. Membership drive materials can be obtained from the VFW Store by submitting the Membership Supplies Order Form located in the Forms Portal on the VFWPACIFIC.ORG website or via the Online Order Form located in the Membership Recruiting & Retention section of the VFW.ORG website.

The All State Dashboard is up and running so now is not too soon to start submitting your completed program requirements. Go after the low hanging fruit like OM Bond (Aug. 30, 2023), Audit #1, Donations, Buddy Poppy orders (THROUGH DPA QM ONLY), Partnering events and anything else you can knock out now. A lot of posts already have approved budgets for the new term that allows for timely expenditure of funds in support of a lot of these programs. PLEASE do notify our respective DPA Program Chairperson when reporting completion of events and please Cc SVCDPA@VFWPACIFIC.ORG. And, as always, please keep those CSR entries coming!

The VETERANS ASSISTANCE GRANT (VAG) is BACK and ready to assist veterans (to include non-VFW Veterans) who have an unexpected financial emergency such as medical expenses. The one-time grant (not to exceed \$500) is not designed to support a veteran who intentionally did not purchase medical insurance or take reasonable care to ensure he can deal with financial emergencies. For this term we are budgeted for \$5,000. Should we approve a grant to a non-VFW member the post should combine this grant with a post fund raising campaign. Email the completed request form and substantiating documents to me at SVCD-PA@VFWPACIFIC.ORG. It will then be voted on by the VAG Committee Members: DPA SVC, DPA JVC, DPA OM, DPA COS, Immediate PDPA CMDR, and the DPA ADJ.





MEDAL OF HONOR RECIPIENTS

Raul Perez "Roy" Benavidez, an American war hero, was born on August 5, 1935, in Cuero, Texas. His remarkable courage, unwavering determination, and selfless acts of valor during the Vietnam War made him a legendary figure in military history. Despite facing numerous challenges and adversity, Benavidez's indomitable spirit and commitment to his fellow soldiers embodied the essence of a true hero.

Benavidez's journey to becoming a war hero was not an easy one. Growing up in a poor family, he faced discrimination and was unable to speak English until he reached the first grade. However, his humble beginnings did not deter him from pursuing his dreams. After completing high school, Benavidez joined the Texas Army National Guard in 1952 and later enlisted in the United States Army in 1955.

In 1965, Benavidez was deployed to Vietnam as an advisor to the South Vietnamese Army. On May 2, 1968, his life took a dramatic turn when he volunteered for a helicopter extraction mission to rescue a 12-man Special Forces team that was surrounded by a large enemy force. As they approached the landing zone, their helicopter was met with intense enemy fire, and Benavidez was severely wounded. Despite his injuries, he rallied himself and jumped out of the helicopter, determined to save his comrades.



What followed was an extraordinary display of heroism. Armed with only a knife, Benavidez engaged in hand-to -hand combat, rescuing the wounded and organizing the defense of the team. He called in airstrikes and directed the extraction efforts, all while sustaining multiple gunshot wounds and shrapnel injuries. Despite being shot in the leg, abdomen, and face, Benavidez refused to give up.

After several hours of relentless fighting, a second extraction helicopter arrived, and Benavidez helped load the wounded onto it. Just as he was about to board the helicopter himself, an enemy soldier clubbed him with the butt of a rifle, leaving him with a serious head injury. Miraculously, he regained consciousness moments before the helicopter lifted off.

Once safely back at the base, Benavidez was thought to be dead due to the extent of his injuries. But he was alive, and his incredible acts of heroism that day did not go unnoticed. For his extraordinary valor, Benavidez was eventually awarded the Medal of Honor by President Ronald Reagan on February 24, 1981.

Beyond his Medal of Honor, Benavidez's military career was marked by numerous accolades, including the Purple Heart, the Distinguished Service Cross, the Bronze Star Medal, and the Vietnam Cross of Gallantry. However, it was his unwavering dedication to his fellow soldiers that truly defined him.

After retiring from the military in 1976, Benavidez continued to serve his community. He frequently spoke to young people about the importance of education and staying true to one's values. He also worked as a counselor for veterans and served as a role model for many. Editor: In 1984 while attending Seabee Chief Petty Officer Management Course in Port Hueneme California, Roy was a featured speaker.

Raul Perez "Roy" Benavidez passed away on November 29, 1998, but his legacy lives on. His story of courage, resilience, and sacrifice serves as an inspiration to all who hear it. Through his extraordinary acts of valor, Benavidez exemplified the best of the human spirit and the true meaning of heroism. His name will forever be etched in the annals of American military history as one of the bravest soldiers to have ever served.



While following the DPA Commanders programs the Surgeon's 2023-2024 goal is to continue to advance teamwork amongst DPA Officers and support positions coordinating with Chaplain, SO, District and Post Surgeons **ensuring the health and wellbeing of our seasoned members remains in the forefront.** We encourage all to pursue activities such as <u>light work outs</u>, <u>golf</u>, <u>walking</u>, <u>running</u>, <u>cycling</u> & <u>swimming as health prevention routines</u>, as a heart patient and working with my Doctor I understand the importance of routine exercise, proper diet etc. "Get up, get out go for that morning walk" and take a comrade or friend with you! Nothing wrong with a little vino, suds or spirit and if a "roll in the hay is what you fancy" get that heart rate going, all in moderation.

June 27th was **PTSD Screening Day**: If you think you may have PTSD, **take the self-screen listed below.** The self-screen can be a good way to start a conversation with your health care provider. You can share your results to help them decide whether you should be assessed for PTSD or other conditions.

If you think you might have PTSD, you're not alone and with only five questions, the self-screen is quick and easy to take. In the PAST MONTH, have you:

- Had nightmares about event or thoughts about events when you did not want to? **Yes or No**
- Tried hard not to think about the event or went out of your way to avoid situations that reminded you of the events? Yes or No
- Been constantly on guard, watchful, or easily startled? Yes or No
- Felt numb or detached from people, activities, or your surroundings? Yes or No
- Felt guilty or unable to stop blaming yourself or others for the event or any problems the events may have caused? Yes or No

If you have scored 2 or more YES, your answers suggest you may have PTSD. Your score does not mean that you have PTSD but you should share and talk with a health care provider to get the help you deserve. PTSD treatment works, a first step toward finding relief is understanding your symptoms

July and August Summer Tips: Stay Hydrated and Beat the heat, staying hydrated is paramount during summer due to the increased risk of dehydration, Nourish your body with Seasonal foods (fruits and vegies), Protect your skin from the sun, apply that screen, wear a cover, Do stay active and enjoy outdoor activities i.e., round of golf, do some fishing / swimming, hiking camping and summer festivals, Prioritize your mental well-being quite time thoughts, reflections & reading.



A LITTLE BIT OF HISTORY

While a student at the University of Virginia, John Mosby was sent to jail after shooting a man. While in jail he befriended his prosecutor, who taught him law. Despite its unusual beginnings, Mosby went on to a successful legal career.

He opposed secession, but once it occurred and war followed, Mosby joined the Virginia cavalry. In 1863 he took command of a regiment of partisan rangers and discovered that he had a gift for irregular warfare.

Over the next two years Mosby came to be one of the most feared Confederate officers. Mosby's Rangers operated in northern Virginia, behind enemy lines, in an area that came to be called "Mosby's Confederacy." His Rangers would strike suddenly and unexpectedly, then seemingly vanish. Because of his sensational daring raids and the elusiveness of his command, Mosby came to be called "The Gray Ghost."

After Robert E. Lee surrendered in April 1865, U.S. Chief of Staff General Henry Halleck issued an order extending the terms of the surrender to all other detachments of Lee's army, whether they had been at Appomattox or not. He closed his order with one exception: "the guerrilla chief Mosby will not be paroled." Under the circumstances, Mosby declined to surrender, and General Winfield Scott Hancock announced a \$5,000 reward for his capture. In mid-June, General Grant intervened, declaring that Mosby was entitled to surrender on the same terms as everyone else. Mosby turned himself in the next day, was paroled, and promptly resumed his law practice.

To the dismay of many of his former countrymen, after the war Mosby became a Republican and a staunch supporter of U.S. Grant, at a time when almost all white Southerners were Democrats. The former hero Mosby was threatened and harassed, seemingly no longer welcome in the place that had once been known as "Mosby's Confederacy." He wrote in his memoirs, "There was more vindictiveness shown to me by the Virginia people for my voting for Grant than the North showed to me for fighting four years against him."

After an assassination attempt in 1876, Grant convinced President Rutherford B. Hayes to appoint Mosby as U.S. Consul to Hong Kong. When he returned to the States, Mosby lived in San Francisco and served as a railroad president. Later he lived in Washington DC where he worked as a lawyer in the Justice Department until he was 76 years old. He died 107 years ago on May 30, 1916, at age 82.

When the United States Army Ranger Hall of Fame was established in 1992, "The Gray Ghost," John Singleton Mosby, was one of the inaugural inductees.


Post Commanders please look at your Quartermaster Bond. Last term, some Post's bond amount was not greater than the total of all accounts, including cash on hand.



A VALUABLE LESSON TO BE LEARNED

Iván Fernández Anaya is a Spanish long-distance runner who gained recognition for his display of sportsmanship during a race in 2012. In a crosscountry competition held in Burlada, Navarre, Fernández found himself trailing behind the race leader. Abel Mutai of Kenya. As they approached the finish line, Mutai slowed down, mistakenly thinking he had already crossed it. Fernández, realizing the error, could have taken advantage of the situation and overtaken Mutai to secure first place. However, instead of capitalizing on the mistake, Fernández chose to act with integrity.

In an act of selflessness, Fernández caught up to Mutai and gestured for him to continue running. Despite the language barrier, his intentions were clear: he wanted Mutai to finish the race rightfully as the



winner. Fernández guided Mutai to the finish line, making sure he crossed it ahead of him. By doing so, he sacrificed his own chance of victory for the sake of fair play and sportsmanship.


Those Amendments and the Resolution adopted at the Convention have been forwarded to National for consideration.

"After several months I finally got my orders to Korea, by way of the El Toro Marine Air Station in California. This was the first time in my adult life I'd been to southern California, and I wanted to see Hollywood. A friend of a friend was the assistant musical director at 20th Century Fox and he invited me onto the lot. We spent a brief time together and then he asked, calmly, as I remember it- much the same way he might have asked if I wanted a cool drink- "Captain McMahon, would you like to meet Marilyn Monroe?"

As soon as she finished the picture, she told me, she was going to go to Korea to entertain the troops. And then she invited me inside her trailer.

It was just the two of us in her trailer, just Marilyn Monroe and Ed McMahon. We spent a half hour together. Marilyn Monroe in person was as beautiful as she was in the fantasies of every American male. She was dressed casually in a pair of slacks and a loose blouse, but she was radiant. She was also sweet. I don't remember what we spoke about, but as I prepared to leave, she said, "It's so nice to meet you. Now I'll know somebody when I get to Korea. How can I find you when I get there?"

The Marine Corps would know where I was stationed, I replied, then said, "I've got to ask you a favor. If I could have a picture of you I could show the guys in the squadron, I'd be the hero of heroes. They'd go wacko!" Actually, looking back, "wacko" was probably a poor word choice.

"I've got a better idea," she said. "Why don't we take a picture? Let me just fix my hair and I'll be right out."

I waited outside for her. When she finally came out, she was dressed in a gorgeous fur coat. She kind of snuggled in next to me and, as the photographer got ready to take our picture, whispered to me, "You know, Ed, I don't have anything on under this.".

So that's why I'm smiling so broadly in that photograph."

DEPARTMENT SERVICE OFFICER (DSO)

Greetings Comrades,

I have been appointed by Commander Fores as the new Department Service Officer (DSO). I will be working out of Thailand this year and I do not foresee any issues in providing continued services to our Veterans and their dependents.

One of the duties of the DSO is to conduct a School of Instruction for all Post, and District Service Officers in the Department. Of note, attending the PSO School of Instruction is also one of the criteria to qualify your post and/or district for the Department All-State Program.

I plan to conduct three training sessions via zoom and will try to address important issues and update you with the current National Veterans Service (NVS) Policies and Procedures. You need to attend only one of the training sessions.

The first of three training sessions will be held 19 August 2023. It will focus on newly appointed post service officers. The second training session is tentatively scheduled for the middle of November 2023 and the final session is tentatively scheduled for the middle of February 2024.

Upon receipt of the Department Memo No.1 for the 2023 – 2024 Term, I will be contacting all Post, District and Assistant Department Service Officers to provide you with additional information and a link to the first zoom meeting. Attendance will be taken and entered into the DPA Dashboard to verify your attendance.

On 14 June 2023, President Joe Biden signed into law the Veterans Compensation Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA) Act of 2023, which directs the Department of Veterans Affairs to provide a cost-of-living adjustment for Veterans benefits in 2024 equal to the COLA applied to Social Security benefits, as determined by the Social Security Administration (SSA).

The legislation, passed with bi-partisan support in the House and Senate, is an annual procedure for Congress but an important one, as it must be accomplished to ensure Veterans receive a COLA, and that it keeps pace with inflationary costs. The COLA will affect certain VA benefits including, but not limited to: disability compensation, clothing allowance and dependency and indemnity compensation (DIC) for spouses and children.

While the exact amount of next year's adjustment has not been determined, it's based on the Consumer Price Index (CPI). The CPI measures the average change in prices of goods and services to preceding years and is used by SSA to determine the annual COLA, which, by law, now applies to VA benefits as well. The last adjustment in January 2023, which Veterans are currently receiving, saw an 8.7% increase following a second year of high inflation.

Based on the timeline of previous years, SSA is expected to announce its 2024 COLA early in the next fiscal year, which begins on 01 October 2023. VA will then set its compensation payment rates to match and Veterans can expect to see the new amounts starting with their January 2024 payment.


REFLECTING ON THE PAST

One recurring theme in his music is the complex relationship he had with his father, and how it has shaped his identity and music.

Reflecting on his father, Springsteen's songs reveal a deep sense of longing, understanding, and ultimately, reconciliation. Born into a working-class family in New Jersey, Springsteen's father, Douglas Frederick Springsteen, played a significant role in shaping his son's worldview and artistic sensibilities. However, their relationship was not always easy, and Bruce's songs are a testament to the complexities of their bond.

"This is the final days of Patti's first pregnancy, and I receive a surprise visit from my father at my home in LA. Now, he'd driven 500 miles unannounced to knock on my door, that's his style. So at 11 a.m. we sit Sunday dining room, and we're nursing morning beers, that's his style.

When, my dad, never a talkative man, right, blurted out, "You've been very good to us". And I nodded that, that I



had, and he says, "And I wasn't very good to you". And, the room just...stood still. As to my shock, the unacknowledgeable was being acknowledged, if I, if I didn't know better I would've sworn an apology of some sort was being made, and it was.

Here in the last days before I was to become a father, my own father was visiting me to warn me of the mistakes that he had made, and to warn me not to make them with my own children. To release them from the chain of our sins, my fathers of mine and our fathers before, that they may be free, to make their own choices and to live their own lives.


We are ghosts or we are ancestors in our children's lives. We either lay our mistakes, our burdens upon them, and we haunt them, or we assist them in laying those old burdens down, and we free them from the chain of our own flawed behavior. And as ancestors, we walk alongside of them, and we assist them in finding their own way, and some transcendence.

My father, on that day, was petitioning me, for an ancestral role in my life after being a ghost for a long long time. He wanted me to write a new end to our relationship, and he wanted me to be ready for the new beginning that I was about to experience.



What and why is Americanism a concept that is specific to the United States?

Among its key concepts are freedom, equality, individualism, and democracy. America is the country full of choices and opportunities. It is believed that the United States is an exceptional nation because of these values. Yet, the most significant distinctive feature of the USA is the wide diversity of ethnicities and ideologies presented among the country's citizens and residents. Even though people's beliefs differ to some extent, each member of the American community has a right to speak up their mind and state their point of view. This is what makes the country strong and unique; with its astonishing landscapes, tasty cuisine, fascinating traditions, and rich cultural heritage. In short, you can say that Americanism is what makes people in the US American.

"This is not a mere idealistic fancy. It is the natural position of this great republic among the nations of the earth. It is its noblest vocation, and it will be a glorious day for the United States when the good sense and the self-respect of the American people see in this their "manifest destiny."

What else makes Americanism unique? It's not at any time dependent on a person's place of birth, but the U.S. values they have accepted. These values include control of one's fate, belief in equal opportunities and not afraid of change. Americanism emphasizes the love for one's country; to include its symbols, such as the flag and the Declaration of Independence. These are the accepted U.S. Valves; as you can see, Americanism has a lot in common with nationalism and patriotism. +But, unlike nationalism, Americanism doesn't regard ethnicity as vital.

There are also some other terms associated with Americanism:

Did you know that Americanism has a long and exciting history?

- Americanism has its roots in the 17th century Protestantism. Back then, people proclaimed the US the "chosen country." It meant that America, with its morals and democratic principles, should be an example to others.
- Later, the colonists won the Revolutionary war. People saw it as proof of the country's special status. They believed that new land offers unlimited opportunities. You only had to work hard.
- Soon, the idea of Manifest Destiny was born. The US was supposed to spread its values throughout the continent. When the era of globalization came, Americanism became even more widespread.
- After World War I, veterans started an organization called the American Legion. They wanted to promote patriotism, democracy, and freedom. Besides, they came up with the concept of "100 percent Americanism". By it, they meant the complete adherence to the US values. The organization still exists today and holds annual Americanism essay contests.
- Theodore Roosevelt is associated with the popularization of Americanism. He encouraged immigrants to come to the US and adopt the American way of living. People from all over the world moved to the United States in search of a better life.


04 AUG Coast Guard Day. Coast Guard Day is primarily an internal activity for active-duty Coast Guard personnel, civilian members, reservists, retirees, auxiliarists, and dependents, but it does have a significant share of interest outside the Service. Grand Haven, Michigan, also known as Coast Guard City, USA, annually sponsors the Coast Guard Festival around August 4. Typically, it is the largest community celebration of a branch of the Armed Forces in the nation.

07 AUG Purple Heart Day is observed every year and is a day to remember and honor the men and women who were wounded, killed, or died in action while serving the U.S. military and received the Purple Heart medal. The Purple Heart is the oldest military award for military merit and was first presented by George Washington in 17821

10 AUG Agent Orange Awareness Day is an annual observation designed to raise awareness of the effects of the herbicide known as Agent Orange, used in Vietnam by American forces to defoliate future and current battlegrounds with the purpose of depriving the enemy ground cover to hide in.

VJ Day, also known as Victory Over Japan Day, is observed on September 2 every year in the United States. It commemorates the official surrender ceremony of the Japanese aboard the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay—an event that occurred on September 2, 1945.
